




National Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month



Human Papillomavirus is the most common STI with about 43 million HPV infections in 2018. Some types of HPV can cause health problems including genital warts and different types of cancers such as vulva, vaginal, penis, and anus cancer. There is no way to know who will or won't develop cancer or other heath problems from HPV. One way to lower your chances of getting HPV is to get vaccinated. Another way is to routinely get screened for cervical cancer. This is recommended for all women aged 21 to 65 years old to prevent cervical cancer.
